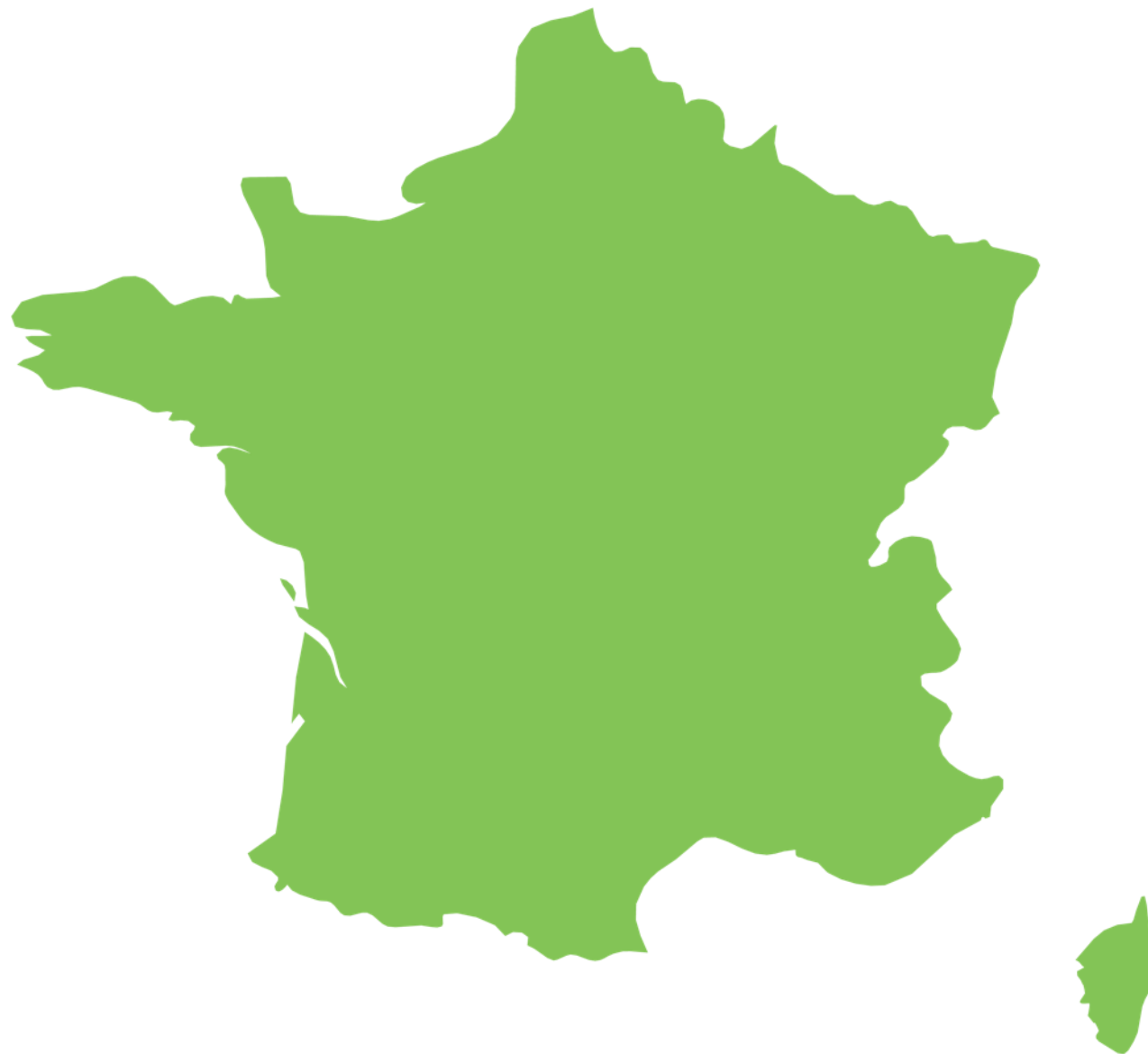

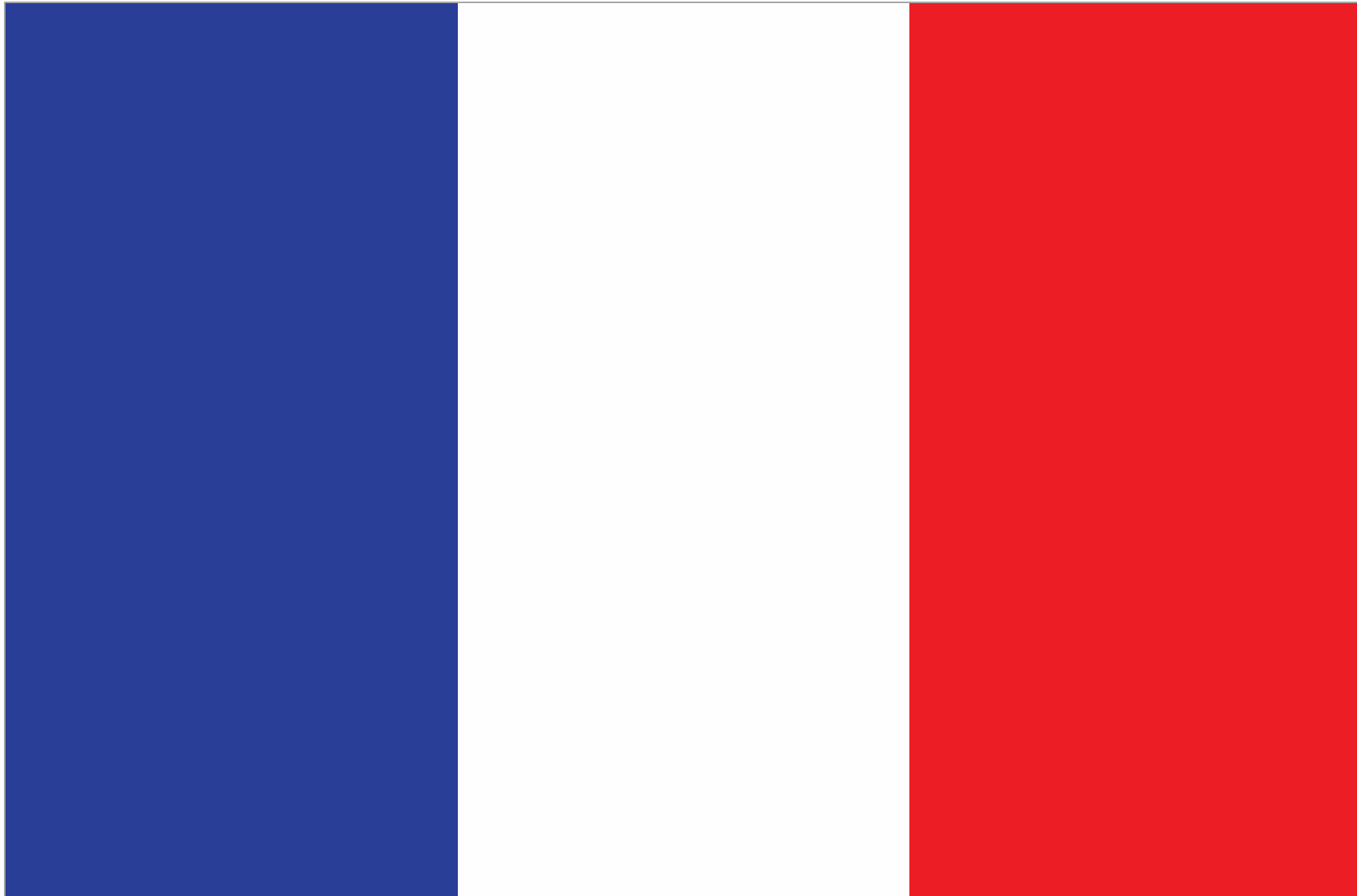

What shape is France?

Soufflé is very difficult to make, so people make it for special events.

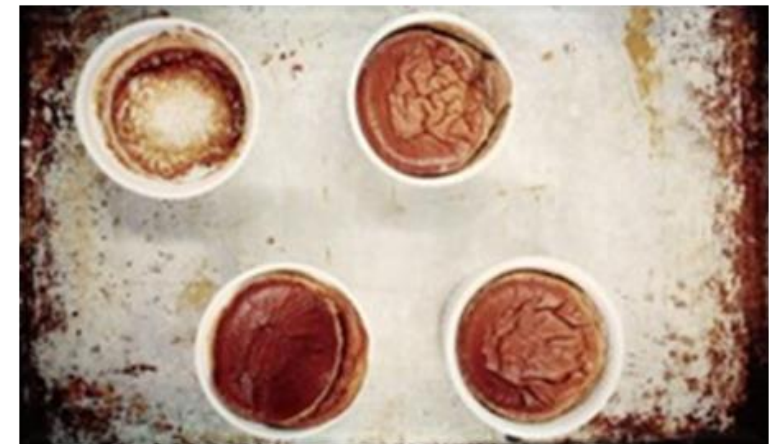
How did soufflé get its name?

Soufflé means “blown up” and a soufflé becomes tall and light when you cook it. It is light and fluffy.



Why should you NOT open the door while a soufflé is cooking?

It will spoil it.



Madeleines

What are madeleines?

They are soft cakes made with eggs, flour, sugar, and butter.

What do madeleines look like?

This cake is shaped like a shell. It is smooth on one side and bumpy on the other.



How did madeleines become popular all over France?

King Louis XV visited Commercy and tried madeleines. He took some home to Paris and soon everyone in France came to enjoy madeleines.

★ **to ruin or destroy something so you cannot use it**

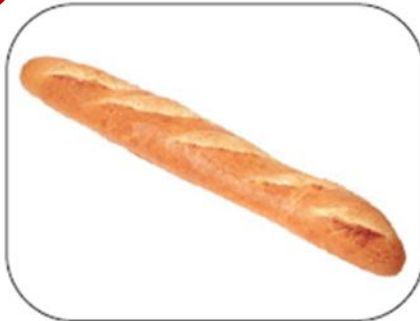
